LEAD CITY COMMISSION Regular Meeting March 17, 2025

The Lead City Commission met on Tuesday, March 17, 2025, in City Hall, 801 West Main Street at 5:30 PM with the following members present: Mayor Ron Everett and Commissioners Dustin Heupel, Roger Thomas, Kayla Klein and Robert Carr. Absent: None. Mayor Everett called the Regular Meeting to order. The Pledge of Allegiance was recited.

APPROVE MINUTES

1. Minutes of the March 03, 2025, Regular Meeting are approved as read.

ITEMS FROM VISITORS

Mayor Everett thanked the Handley Center for hosting the Mile High Basketball Tournament and the Ski Club for bringing in over 100 skiers for their event.

CITY ENGINEER

PUBLIC WORKS

1. Robin Lucero stated there was a resignation in the water department and would like to request to fill position. They would like to go back through the previous applications before posting the ad for the job.

LIBRARY

1. Sarah Shoop with the Hearst Library gave a brief update on House Bill 1239. Sarah stated the original bill proposed to remove affirmative defense for librarians, educators and museum workers and open them up to possible jail time and extensive fines if they were caught "disseminating" obscene materials to minors. The original wording of the bill was very vague, not well worded and did not accurately reflect what the sponsor, Representative Bethany Soye, said about it. This was why many librarians were concerned about the bill. Senator David Wheeler from Huron proposed an amendment at the Senate meeting on Monday, March 10th that would keep affirmative defense for librarians, but make it so that all libraries would have to include in their Challenged Materials Policies an option for someone to take a case to court if they object against an item in a library and they feel that the governing body (library board, school board, etc.) has not taken proper action. Sarah feels that this is a good compromise. The amended bill passed through the Senate as well as the House and now needs to be signed by the governor on March 31st.

PLANNING AND ZONING

- 1. Variance Request: 406 Barclay Ave:
 - Planning and Zoning denied the variance request for 406 Barclay at the previous zoning meeting, and it was their suggestion for the city commission to also deny this request. Schumacher stated they have a plan to meet at 406 Barclay to make a plan to help the homeowner clean the area up.
