## Lead is starting to thrive once again!

The City of Lead adopted a new Comprehensive Plan in 2025 and a public survey completed by 481 residents showed comments such as:

- "The Love for this community runs DEEP."
- "I love our community. It is small enough to fee l close-knit, but ambitious enough to seek new opportunities."
- "I love the small-town feel of Lead. I love how friendly everyone is. Lead has such character and history that make it a wonderful place to live."
- "That Lead is on the right path. The business and growth are improving."

\*The 2025 Comprehensive Plan is available on the City of Lead website under comprehensive plan!

- Mil levy will be 5.404
   (Down from 5.734 for 2025)
- Sales tax revenue: \$1,500,000
- Increased street repair budget to ~\$100,000
- Budgeted \$80,000 for City Shop Facility planning
- Included over \$65,000 for water/sewer upgrades, including a much-needed backup generator for the South Mill lift station
- Set aside \$60,000 to update our Facility Plan allowing the City to apply for federal, state and local funding for future infrastructure projects
- Supported local organizations
- Working on a plan to assume operations of the Handley Center after May 2026
- Plan to use surplus auction revenue and excess sales tax revenue for street department upgrades at the end of FY 2025

## Infrastructure

The City of Lead continues to make strides toward improving the public services that we provide!

Water Loss: The City crew has continued to improve the water distribution system after purchasing a water correlator. The correlation program along with a dedicated team has allowed the City of Lead to reduce our water loss from 66% to less than 33% over the last few years!

19 water leaks so far in 2025: This year was not short on action in the water department, maintaining a 120+ year old water system is not for the faint of heart!

**Deadwood Supply Line Plans**

The Deadwood Supply Line Project, which began the planning phase in 2023, will be completed this week!

This project upgraded ~2,500' of a 6" water line that serves all of Deadwood, Mile High and Grizzly Gulch to an 8" line.

This was a joint project with the City of Lead and the Lead Deadwood Sanitary District.

The project is located on SDSTA property.

Halme Inc. is the contractor that was awarded the bid.

We are hopeful this project will help reduce our water loss in this area of the system. As well as reduce maintenance costs since it cost ~\$30,000 to fix a water leak in this area due to the depth of the water line, which happened to break about once a year.

We are excited to continue to make improvements to our water distribution system!

## Infrastructure

Washington Street was our paving project this year and was just completed last week; Sacrison Paving was the contractor for that project.







The City crew is working toward completion of fixing a nearly 200' long retaining wall that failed that supports Houston Street.





## Development

For 2025, we have had 4 new homes and one commercial auto shop building permit.

We also had an ATV rental business and the Dollar General move to town, among other businesses!

July of 2025 was the 3<sup>rd</sup> highest month for sales tax revenue in 7 years.

Lead and Wessington Springs Selected for Travel South Dakota's New Destination Development Program

PIERRE, S.D. – Travel South Dakota is proud to announce that the communities of Lead and Wessington Springs have been selected as the first participants in the state's Destination Development Program, a new initiative designed to strengthen and expand tourism in rural communities in South Dakota.

The program works in partnership with George Washington University Institute for Tourism Studies and Crosscurrent Collective to equip rural communities with strategic planning assistance, access to subject-matter experts, professional development, and marketing opportunities. These resources help communities create welcoming environments, develop authentic visitor experiences, and build sustainable tourism growth that benefits both residents and the local economy.

"Developing and supporting tourism offerings, especially in rural areas, is a key part of our strategic plan, and we are thrilled to get to work with these two communities; said James Hagen, Secretary of the South Danbert Department of Tourism: "Lead and Wessington Springs both impressed us with their vision, community engagement & dedication, and commitment to building unique, high-quality visitor experiences. We see tremendous potential in both communities."

The application pool was competitive with quality applications. A total of 15 communities submitted proposals for review. While only two communities were selected for the pilot program, many communities will benefit with templates and guides generated through the process that will be shared with the entire industry.






- SURF has been identified the preferred research location for particle physics by an international panel of physicists that meets once a decade!



















